

Ageing:

Bill:	Adult Male (3+) breeding - black; non-breeding – similar to female;	Adult Female (3+) upper mandible pinkish brown with greyer base;	Immature (2-) similar to adult female;	Juvenile similar to adult female;
Gape:	as for bill;	greyish, yellowish- grey, pinkish-grey, pale yellow or white;	similar to adult female, but cream or brighter yellow;	yellow;
Tongue:	black;	pink with black markings;	yellow changing to adult colour before adult plumage moult;	orange-yellow with black markings;

Outer tail feathers of juveniles are narrow and pointed, whereas Adults are broad and rounded; Immatures retain all or most juvenile remiges, greater primary coverts and rectrices and varying number of juvenile greater and median coverts;

Retained juvenile feathers are contrastingly more worn and shorter than the replacing feathers and synchronous growth bars are usually visible in the tail;

Full adult plumage is first attained in a birds' third year, thus adults are aged (3+);

Immatures can be aged as either (1), (2) or (2-) depending on plumage condition and time of year

Sexing: NOTE: Birds must be sexed before being banded.

At all ages, sex can be determined by measurements, with males being significantly larger than females:

Males in breeding condition have a black bill and gape, but appear to change seasonally to adult female-like colours of brown, grey-brown, or dark flesh brown with a paler lower mandible; Only the female develops a brood patch.
