Ageing and sexing:

Bill depth\*: Tarsus:

Post-juvenile moult results in immature plumage within 2 - 3 months of hatching and moult to adult plumage commences at about 1 year old. Thus adults are aged (2+). Adult females are considerably larger than males (see measurements above) and can also be sexed on plumage characteristics as illustrated above and as follows:

Forehead & forecrown:	Adult Male (2+) mottled brown & black-brown;	Adult Female (2+) finely spotted black and white;
Supercilium, lores & ear coverts:	rufous-buff, white bases of feathers sometimes exposed on lores, dark	white to pale buff finely scaled by black fringes to feathers
	brown tips make ear coverts look darker than supercilium;	making some birds look dark-faced;
Chin & throat:	white;	orange-rufous;
Breast, flanks, thighs vent & under-tail-coverts:	pale orange-rufous grading to white on on belly;	mostly dark orange-rufous to rufous-brown, usually with centre of belly white;

Immatures of both sexes can also be identified on the same plumage characteristics, they are simply paler than the adults – see illustrations;

Incubation by male only.
