
Eastern Ground Parrot Pezoporus wallicus Species No.: 311 Band size: 23



Status:

Formerly recognised as the Ground Parrot comprising two subspecies *P.w. wallicus* in Tasmania and the east coast of the mainland and *P.w. flaviventris* of coastal s-w WA. In 2010 both subspecies were elevated to full species status on the basis of molecular DNA evidence. A separate profile sheet covers the Western Ground Parrot.

Bill:	dark grey;	pink, slightly grey around nostrils, but darkens
		at about 8 weeks and adult colour by 6 months;
Cere:	light grey to dark grey;	initially pink, changing to creamy white, then to dark grey;
Iris:	cream or pale yellow, with small brown flecks in the iris for 2-3 years:	dark brown at fledging changing to grey-brown at 1-2 months, brown at 4 months to pale red-brown at 7 to 12 months;

Overall plumage of juveniles is yellower than adults as per illustrations;

Undergo complete post-juvenile moult to adult-like plumage is probably completed around one year old, but timing is not known; Adults should be aged (2+)
